After The Great Flood by Cllr Steve Tribe

At the January TPC meeting after 23rd December floods, we set up a the Thornborough Flood Action Group TFAG, comprising of 2 councillors, 2 residents and an ex resident with flood control knowledge and expertise.

At the first flood group meeting the main risk areas, High Street and Lower End were not surprisingly identified as areas of concern to focus on. Quick fix, medium term and long term plans were identified and the various agencies contacted. Cllr Goodger and his brother along with Cllr Tribe started clearing the culverts and grips (road to ditch gulleys) from Lower End up to the pumping station which unearthed a badly installed high voltage cable and a broken drainage pipe. Within a day Western Power repaired the damage and the ditches emptied.

During the same week, after receiving input from Cllr Warren Whyte, we learnt of the section 19 flood investigation act and how it could be used to assess our flood issues and help identify fixes. As we needed at least 5 flooded properties documented and reported to Buckinghamshire Council's Strategic Flood Team to qualify for help, the group set to work and completed the task within a day.

A site meeting with the Internal Drainage Board (IDB), Buckinghamshire Council's Strategic Flood Team, Transport For Bucks (TfB) and our team was agreed and a preliminary local survey undertaken.

As a result the IDB have agreed to provide a quote and help obtain funding to clear the silted bridge arch and the inter bridge stream between Lower End and Hatchet Leys and at a later date to undertake a survey of the stream down to the river. TFB have accepted responsibility for the left hand ditch silt removal from Hatchet Leys up to the pumping station and agreed to clear blocked drains and grips throughout the village and to investigate the lost ditch in Back Street. Opposite the Pavilion the water drains from the fields down towards Back Street, across the verge and onto the road because the ditch was filled in and a subterranean small bore drain was installed without consideration as to how to deal with the field run off. We hope this will be resolved by reinstating the ditch or reconnecting the field run off drain. In the meantime the existing ditch from the bottom of Back Street and up to the pumping station will be cleared by the land owner to help reduce ponding between Back Street and Hatchet Leys.

There is a lot more to do before we can test our actions and hopefully with spring approaching we will have time to complete some of the tasks.

Reflections from the Rectory by Rev'd Jacqueline Dove

I lived in Mozambique for 11 years because my husband Richard was working with World Vision, a Christian charity helping the subsistence farmers improve their food security and the nutritional value of their crops. I can still recall the shock I felt the first time someone in Mozambique matter of factly referred to the 'tempo de fome' (time of hunger), as if being hungry was normal. For two months people are hungry as the staple foods of maize and beans run out, before the next harvest fills the 'storerooms' once again. The raised storerooms are constructed out of bamboo and despite rat guards on each of the four poles, the harvest is shared with rats and many other small creatures, and so runs out creating the 'tempo de fome'. During this time people live off mandioca (cassava) a root which contains cyanide, unless prepared properly, which is a very long process. One can imagine if we spent two months every year only eating tapioca it would eclipse the weather as our key complaint.

I found it interesting to learn that fasting during Lent can be linked to this time of hunger. Historically Lent comes when the winter food supplies are at their lowest so in many places fasting during lent used to be a matter of life and death. People fasted to make the food supply last longer. If everyone fasted together the community had a better chance of surviving. Lent gave spiritual significance to a time of physical hunger, and in doing so helped enable people to co-operate together for the common good. Lent reminds us that loving our neighbour as ourselves often requires sacrifice.

This pandemic has highlighted the need for us to co-operate together for the common good. During this pandemic we have sacrificed a lot to save the lives of the most vulnerable. Good Friday reminds us that sacrifice is a key element to true love. The good news is that true love leads to the wonderful joy celebrated on Easter Sunday. Happy Easter!

The Church Tower Continued.....by Sue Kenyon - Project Manager

Unfortunately, we will need to scaffold the Church Tower once again this Spring. As you can see, the lime render applied late last year has failed. This is partly due to the excessively wet and freezing weather we've had, but mostly due to the timing of the work. Very wet weather in October/November meant the render could not cure properly and gain its full strength. We were aware that there was a risk of failure when we applied the render so late in the year, but we also knew the parapet brickwork, once exposed,



needed protection. After being let down by our main contractors last year, who had to remove two lots of inappropriate render, we were left with two choices by the end of September - render the parapet, knowing the time of year and the weather was against us, or leave the parapet vulnerable to the rigours of winter, with the risk of falling masonry very high. Thankfully, the render has done a great job of protecting the brick parapet, but its strength has clearly been compromised by the extremes of wet and cold weather. We've taken advice from SPAB (the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings), who have confirmed that the render itself and the way it was applied was correct, just the time of year, as we knew, inappropriate. So, we will once again welcome Sean Lardner back in the Spring to complete the job at the correct time of year.

Churchyard Regulations

When someone you love has died, it is a time of great sadness and pain. One of the hardest things is that there is no longer an immediate way to show the person how much you love them. Often, we wish we had the opportunity to tell them how much they meant to us. One of the ways we reach out to those we love but no longer see is to leave flowers at their grave. In the case of children this might include toys.

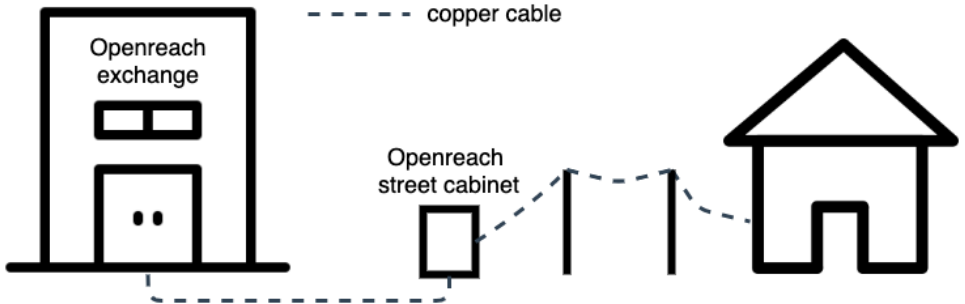
I think instinctively we all want to provide whatever comfort we can to someone who is grieving, and so feel that they should be given the choice to honour their loved ones in whatever way they choose to do so. However, there are legally binding Churchyard Regulations to help make sure the churchyard is a place of beauty and peace for everyone to enjoy for the next several hundred years. A maxim of Brene Brown, a well-known sociologist, is: Clear is Kind, Unclear is Unkind. So hopefully this is clear. In summary the key regulations are:

1. Only natural stone, with a non-reflecting surface can be used for headstones which need to also comply with specific measurements and designs. For example, they cannot be heart shaped.
2. Inscriptions must be simple, reverent and theologically acceptable.
3. Individual gardens, including the planting of shrubs are not permitted; but the minister may authorise the planting of a small number of bulbs.
4. Plastic flowers and plastic wreaths are not permitted; except that wreaths and other arrangements of artificial poppies may be introduced to commemorate those who have died in the service of their country in time of war or other conflict.
5. Cut flowers and silk flowers may be left at the place of burial or interment of cremated remains but must be removed once they are decaying or have become faded.
6. Graves may not be fenced.
7. With the permission of the minister, up to 3 toys or similar objects may be left at the place of burial or interment of cremated remains for a period of 12 months from the date of burial or interment but must be removed at the end of that period.

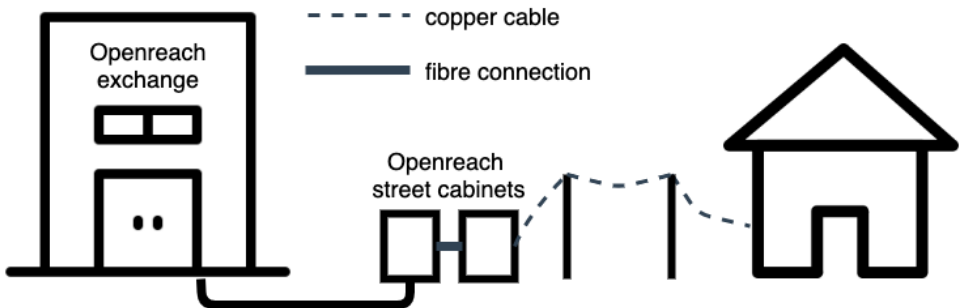
Broadband & Fibre for Thornborough Explained

When we first got broadband (before 2015):



- known as ADSL
- copper from exchange to cabinet
- **copper from cabinet to house**
- designed for telephone lines
- **maximum data speed = 8Mbps**
- copper is bad because:
 - speed degrades over distance: **copper loses half its speed @ 4km** from exchange (and our cable comes via Padbury!)
 - can be affected by RF interference (causing dropouts)
 - **speeds below 0.5Mbps were very common in the village**

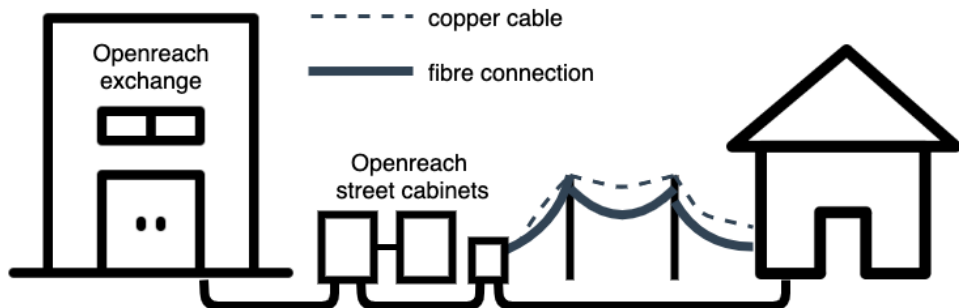
When we got so-called “Superfast fibre” (2015 to today):



- known as FTTC (**fibre to the cabinet**)
- FIBRE from exchange to a new Openreach cabinet
- **still copper from cabinet to house**
- **maximum data speed = 70Mbps (cannot go higher because of physics)**
- all copper problems still there (speed degradation, dropouts etc)

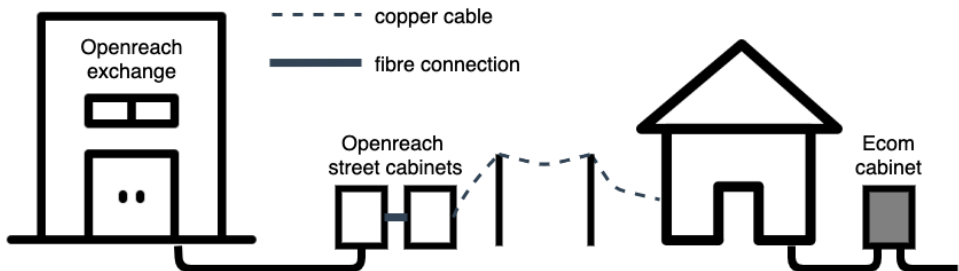
The Future: Full Fibre to the Premises (2021 & beyond)

A) Openreach “ultrafast fibre” model:



- known as FTTP (fibre to the premises)
- FIBRE from exchange to a third Openreach cabinet
- FIBRE from Openreach cabinet to house
- **maximum data speed = 1000Mbps (typically sold at 300Mbps)**
- all copper problems resolved
- either installed via telegraph poles and/or underground (both shown)

B) Ecom “gigabit fibre” model:



- also FTTP
- FIBRE from business connection to new Ecom cabinet
- FIBRE from Ecom cabinet to house
- copper from Openreach cabinet to house is still in place
- **maximum data speed = 1000Mbps (typically sold at 300Mbps)**
- all copper problems resolved
- installed underground

Benefits of FTTP:

- ***Futureproofed***: current connections cannot go above 70Mbps; ibre can go to 1000Mbps (1Gbps)
- ***More reliable***: no dropouts from RF interference
- ***Better performance***: faster download, faster upload, lower latency
- ***Increased house value***: buyers look for ultrafast broadband
- ***No reduction in speed***: everyone gets the same regardless of distance from cabinet

New 'Fibre to the Premises' (FTTP) Schemes:

Openreach now potentially available!

In the last edition of Thornborough News, the '*Help Super Fast Broadband Come to Thornborough NOW*' article discussed the need for reliable, high speed broadband for those living, learning and working in rural communities. It concluded that the best way forward for Thornborough and Thornton was to **adopt 'Fibre to the Premises' (FTTP)**, because only FTTP would be reliable enough and have the speed (ie up to 1000mbps versus the current max of c.70mbps) to enable '*Ultra Fast*' broadband and support all the data-hungry things we need or want to do online, like high quality video calls, HD movie-streaming, 3D gaming and file transfer to and from the cloud. Achieving FTTP, however, is complicated by geography and choosing between suppliers.

What's new, then?

Previously it was assumed an Openreach solution was many years away. As such, a project focussed initially on Thornborough village, was proposed for delivery by a small local company. Whilst this would give many village residents their FTTP solution, it was not fully inclusive and the proposed fibre distribution method (burying cables in new-dig trenches) would initially restrict the network primarily to the village centre due to the cost of delivering the fibre to them.

Recently, a Buckinghamshire councillor encouraged a number of local residents to ask Openreach to propose their own FTTP scheme, to cover as many properties as possible, across Thornborough and Thornton parishes.

There are now two main FTTP schemes 'on the table' from Openreach, if sufficient local commitment is forthcoming, that potentially could be delivered within 12 months of those commitments being finalised.

Sounds interesting! What are these two main Openreach schemes?

Openreach FTTP schemes are designed around groups of properties that share distribution cabinets and telephone exchanges. The first proposal is for a combined Thornborough and Thornton scheme, covering most of the 290 properties across both parishes that have 01280 telephone numbers and use cabinets that link them to the Buckingham exchange. While not all the parishes' properties would be covered, this scheme would address the majority of them.

The second proposal is for Great Horwood parish, as requested by residents there and covers properties with 01296 numbers, linked to Winslow's exchange. This scheme will cover all the remaining properties in Thornborough parish with an 01296 number.

Full coverage of Thornton parish is more complex, as its properties have a mixture of 01280 and 01908 numbers using multiple cabinets connected to different exchanges. Other Openreach proposals are being explored for the Thornton properties not covered already by the two schemes named above.

What will Openreach do?

An Openreach scheme will use the fibre from their network to reach each property's curtilage, for example to the front gate or end of the drive. They will then make the final connection from there into the relevant building, when the owner subscribes to a suitable broadband service from their chosen provider.

Fibre is already provided by Openreach from their exchange to their cabinets and, wherever possible, Openreach use their telegraph poles and ducting to route the new FTTP connections. Thus, most properties in Thornborough and Thornton villages, along the A421, in The Coombs as well as in other outlying areas can all be connected. As the need for new-dig trenching is minimised, so is the associated traffic disruption and damage to verges and driveways.

Why go with Openreach?

Openreach, part of the BT Group, is a long-established and well-respected company, with strong financial backing and long-term viability. It has a proven record of supplying and maintaining not only Great Britain's national fibre transmission network, but also millions of high performance, reliable fibre connections made to it.

Using Openreach as our FTTP scheme supplier reduces risks to the delivery, operation and long-term support of our proposed new fibre network.

Who will fund the Openreach FTTP schemes?

The Openreach FTTP schemes will be 'joint-funded' schemes, partially funded by Openreach with the rest covered by:

1. **Central government funding:** The Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) will provide 'Rural Gigabit' vouchers, worth £1,500 per rural home and £3,500 for small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) in rural areas. Vouchers are free and provided one per household or SME that requests it, for onwards assignment to their chosen FTTP scheme provider. See more details at: <https://gigabitvoucher.culture.gov.uk/>
2. **Local authority funding:** Buckinghamshire Council may add 'top up' voucher funding at £2,000 per rural home and £3,500 per SME. The figures for the

next funding period have not yet been released. See more details at:

3. **Indirect subscriber funding:** participating property owners will only need to commit to a minimum 12-month fibre broadband contract from their chosen Internet Service Provider, utilising the new FTTP infrastructure.

There will be no upfront or 'out of pocket' costs for scheme subscribers other than the minimum contract commitment in (3) above, which applies to all joint-funded FTTP schemes, regardless of supplier. This means that for many of us we can keep our current provider and just upgrade our broadband package. You are also free to look around and choose a new provider (eg EE, Sky, Talk Talk, BT, Zen to name a few)! To check on current pricing levels, there are now many price comparison websites and one of them can be found here:

OK, what's next?

Openreach will work out for each scheme, how many households and SMEs will need to sign up to make the scheme viable. This will be the target that we as the local community need to reach, in terms of committing our vouchers in (1) above and to taking up broadband fibre services as in (3) above, in order to make the schemes happen.

Central government (and probably Buckinghamshire Council) funding should become available again from April 1st 2021. **It is expected that property owners covered by the Thornborough and Thornton scheme will receive paper-based communications from Openreach in April inviting them to:**

- **Sign up for this Openreach FTTP scheme**
- **Commit their DCMS 'Rural Gigabit' voucher to this scheme**
- **Confirm this voucher commitment to the DCMS**
- **Commit to taking up an applicable fibre service with a broadband provider when this Openreach FTTP scheme goes live.**

Instructions will be given at that time as to how to make these commitments.

Once the target number of commitments has been made to the Openreach FTTP scheme and this has been confirmed to the DCMS, Openreach will plan, design and execute the necessary practical work to install it for us. Once the scheme has been finalised, we can expect it to be delivered to our communities within 12 months. When it goes live, those households and SMEs that have committed to this scheme will be expected to order their new Full Fibre broadband service.

The same basic process will apply for those properties covered by the separate Great Horwood FTTP scheme. It will be determined and co-ordinated by their community scheme leader. -Thornton properties not covered by this scheme have already been informed.

Thornborough Infant School Update by Miss Olivia Quirke and the Board of Governor



It is without question that 2021 has been the most unusual start for the school. We were very sad not to welcome all the children back after the Christmas holiday, we were, however, very happy and proud to offer face-to-face teaching to the children of our keyworker and vulnerable families. You may have even seen us around the village either going for a walk or completing our 'Daily Mile' running.

For our children that had to stay at home, we offered remote learning through daily video lessons by Miss Thomas, dance videos by our specialist dance teacher Miss Owens and story time and assembly by Miss Quirke. Activities were fun, exciting and engaging, encouraging the children to be creative, to use the outdoor area and to enrich.

At the time of writing this, we are very much looking forward to welcoming all the children back on Monday 8th March. Undoubtedly this has been a sensitive time, with many feeling the effects of not being able to socialise with their friends. The children will be very excited to be in school, and we cannot wait either. Every measure will be in place to support a smooth transition back, through their learning environment but most importantly, unconditional support for their emotional wellbeing.

Moving forward with the school and future thinking is part of the School's Development Plan, something that the Governors and I are always in discussions with. We know our village school has, in the past, had some trying times, but it is with enormous pride and excitement that once again, for the second year running, we have very good numbers (double figures) for our Reception intake for September 2021.

When we are given the 'green light' we intend to re-ignite our contact with Pre-school, working collaboratively for the young children of Thornborough, and nurturing those important close links we have. I have also had very positive and constructive conversations with fellow Heads of neighbouring schools to support the transition of our Year 2 children when they must leave to take their Junior school place. This is in the hope to also work together to support our parents and avoid the 'In-Year' transitions that have sadly, in the past, affected us.

We know how important these relationships are, now more than ever, not only from the aftermath of the pandemic, but for the future of the school. It is with that thought, that the Governors and I would like to let you know that 'behind the scenes' we have been working hard and creatively thinking of ways to extend the school, either through to Year 6 or Pre-School. We are all aware that to do

this we need an extension of the school, an additional building. Some incredible fundraising happened last year, as you know, which has been ring-fenced. However, after receiving formal documents which have previously not been seen, we know that this cannot happen. An application for a building was tendered in 2009, to replace the building that was demolished, and through many planning restrictions was not granted. We have had this re-looked at, in the light of some years passing, but the reasons to reject the application still hold strong.

Whilst we are so disappointed our wonderful school cannot expand, we **are** growing not only with admissions but with new Governors, new staff and new families – I for one am incredibly honoured to be part of this, and I know we have a great future. Thornborough Infant School will remain an Infant school, something that is very rare and unique in the educational landscape at the moment. We want to use this uniqueness to our benefit and continue our journey on being an outstanding school, passionate about Early Years education and giving the best academic and pastoral start to every child that attends.

Finally, I want to thank the children, our families, the community and village for their support. It has been quite a journey getting here, but I am confident that our school has turned a corner and will continue to grow from strength to strength.

Thornborough Parish Council (TPC) Report

TPC has continued to meet remotely. The minutes of the TPC meetings provide the formal record of the business and are published on the TPC noticeboard and website <https://thornboroughparish.org.uk/about-tpc/tpc-minutes/>. The things which are likely to be of greatest relevance to residents are summarised below.

There is a separate report from the Thornborough Flood Action Group, established after the flooding just before Christmas and is led by TPC Chair.

2021/22 committee year timetable

The government has said the emergency legislation will not be extended; local councils will therefore be required to hold face to face meetings after 6 May 2021. However, the relevant professional bodies are continuing to press for the legislation to be extended and/or for legislation to permit hybrid meetings. There are widespread concerns within the sector about the viability of hybrid meetings for small, rural parish councils. TPC will monitor the matter closely.

The date of the Annual Parish Meeting is as it is because of the forthcoming election. The various community organisations and groups will be asked to prepare written reports in good time and in advance of the meeting. The election also determines the date of the Annual Parish Council Meeting which is effectively a governance meeting.

Elections - 6 May 2021

The local council elections have now been postponed for 2 years – initially in 2019 because of the establishment of the unitary authority and then by the pandemic last year. They are combined with elections for Buckinghamshire Council, and the Police and Crime Commissioner. Please get in touch if you'd like more information. The key dates are:

Planning

Since the last report, TPC has dealt with various planning applications and more significantly a planning appeal (20/00088/REF, 19/03284/APP) for a dwelling on the land adjacent to the New Inn in the High Street. The appeal was not upheld by Buckinghamshire Council. There is increasing evidence that, despite the pandemic, the effectiveness of the Buckinghamshire Council Planning and Enforcement Teams has improved significantly under the unitary authority. The officers are working hard to achieve the objectives put in place to improve the service.

Financial Year 2021/21 Budget and Precept Setting

The budget and precept for 2021/22 has been set at £22,632 to cover TPC's known financial commitments after account is taken of 'other' income, an increase of 16.4%, which means a council tax increase of £10.60 (88p pcm) for a band D property. Any unspent funding will be transferred to help build the reserve which currently doesn't meet the good practice guidance. The Finance Group carefully scrutinised both expenditure and 'other' income before recommending the increase for approval by TPC. The introduction of charges for commercial adverts in Thornborough News reflects this. This decision was not taken lightly and was informed by policy in several small local rural parishes where the village newsletter is either wholly or largely funded by advertising.

Parking in the village

Whilst local councils don't have any jurisdiction over parking, TPC has received expressions of concern from some residents. The parking on pavements concerns are about pushchairs and wheelchairs not being able to use the pavement which gives rise to potential road safety issues. These concerns are

compounded by the need for social distancing because of the pandemic. There are also concerns about parking on the verges which in bad weather results in unavoidable rutting and damage to the verges.

TPC recognises many of the pavements and verges are in poor condition. It also recognises Buckinghamshire Council has many demands on its limited resources. In view of this, we have talked about arranging some community volunteer events to reclaim the pavements and repair the verges. If the roadmap out of lockdown goes to plan, we may be able to arrange something over the summer. I understand **in the past the verges have been repaired by village volunteers so I hope TPC will again get an enthusiastic response.**

Please take care when parking and do get in touch if you'd like talk about this or volunteer to help.

And finally

Thanks to an online competition **TPC is now the proud owner of a Handicart Duo for litter picking.** It allows litter to be separated into what can and what cannot be recycled. 10 year old Merryn has been growing her hair so that she can donate 16 inches of it to the Little Princess Trust. 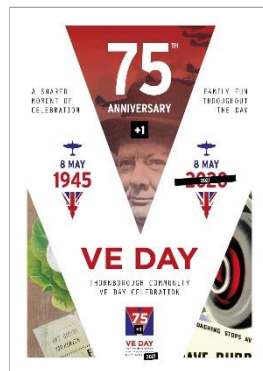
I am afraid that now we know the very cautious roadmap to release us from lockdown, we sadly have no alternative but to cancel the above event.
