

#### Reflection from the Rectory by Rev'd Jacqueline Dove

I'm writing this while flying up in the clouds on my way to SA to see my father who is unwell. The first thing that comes to mind being surrounded by clouds is George Capel who used to love to fly. I had the great privilege of taking the funeral of George on 16 January. George lived till 98 years of age and spent most of those years in Thornborough. The Capel's have links to Thornborough going back 300 years.

Ever wondered who designed the distinctive gates seen if walking on the footpaths which run either side of the rectory? Well, they were designed by George who was both farmer and artist. George was well respected in the village and remembered for his natural charm and willingness to help. St Mary's church is particularly grateful for all he did to help with the restoration of the church bells. He is also remembered by those who have lived long in Thornborough for the times, when in the RAF, he would fly low over his parents' house, buzzing the village, for his mother's benefit. George is survived by his wife Margaret, son Martin, daughter Judith and grandchildren and great grandchildren. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

There have been a number of new arrivals to the village and it's been great meeting them at the monthly Porch Sales. They tell me they have been warmly welcomed which is great to hear. Sociologists tell us that as humans we are wired (created) for connection which is why the church, chapel, pub and other village associations are so integral to the village life people are looking for. Village groups are dependent on volunteers willing to give their time and talents if they are to survive. George knew this and set a great example to follow. May you too follow in his footsteps and get stuck in to keep the community spirit alive.

#### **Thornborough Methodist Chapel**

We are now well into the New Year and are looking forward to what it brings. Life for all us brings many things that we celebrate such as births & birthdays, marriages, anniversaries etc. The church celebrates many events too but its year is based on three liturgical seasons:

Advent & Christmas - when we prepare for and celebrate the birth of Jesus.

**Lent & Easter**: **Lent** is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday – the day before Good Friday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter.

**Easter** - when we remember the Crucifixion of Jesus on Good Friday but then celebrate his resurrection on Easter Sunday.

**Pentecost** - commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and other disciples following the Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus and it marks the beginning of the Christian church's mission to the world.

May you have much to celebrate this year, especially the three seasons above.

#### **Thornborough Flood Action Group report December 2022**

#### History, Actions and the Future

On December 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2020, prolonged rain caused flooding in Thornborough, Thornton, Buckingham and the country at large.

Three properties were flooded in the centre of the village and two more at Thornborough Mill. Also several properties were flooded in Thornton.

We established a 'Section 19' investigation and report on this event. A Section 19 flood report is a public statement of the circumstances of a flood event, which establishes the responsible risk management authorities as well as the functions they have exercised or propose to exercise as a result of the flooding event.

Such a report was made by Buckinghamshire Council (BC) with the help of rivers authorities and Thornborough Flood Action Group (TFAG) and all the flood affected residents.

The Thornborough Flood Action Group was formed to work with Thornborough Parish Council (TPC), the Internal Drainage Board (IDB) and a number of Bucks Council departments.

During the subsequent visits by the various people responsible for maintenance, a number of road ditches and gullies were identified as needing work.

In June 2021 the IDB carried out clearing of the stream bed at Lower End and widened the stream upstream of the bridge. They also improved the stream downstream of Hatchets Leys Lane. These works should significantly improve the water flows out of the village centre.

The landowner of the field adjacent to Back Street cleared ditches within and outside his fields as part of the improvement works.

The Section 19 review was done by BC's Consultants and was then reviewed by TFAG and by the affected residents at Thornton Mill and House. The latter weren't too impressed.

This Autumn TFAG members with the very helpful support of the landowners inspected both brooks which join just upstream of the playing field with a view to identifying possible places where the flow could be temporarily delayed.

TFAG have spoken to all the landowners upstream of Tonne Brook entering the village and are delighted with the flood mitigation measures taken to slow the flow of water into the village centre.

Tonne Brook to the south of the Thornton Road enters the village at Bridge Street. The other stream to the north of the valley, Thorn Brook, enters via the ford in Back Street.

TFAG decided that there were limited further opportunities to significantly delay flows into the village and will instead focus on asking residents to be vigilant in identifying blocked flow channels and then reporting them to TPC for pushing BC to get them cleared.

The fact that Thornborough warranted the expense of a significant piece of scientific analysis and reporting should act as an incentive to BC staff to be quicker to respond to complaints. We hope...

TFAG expert and civil engineer (Crad Allerton – former Thornborough resident), Ray Goodger and Bernard Garbe are a part of the TFAG team and will be happy to advise homeowners in the village on measures that they can take in flood mitigation from the knowledge that we have gained in this investigation.

We are certain that there will be another flood event in the next few years – in any month of the year.

So our message is 'adopt a drain'. Blocked drains were a significant cause of the last flood. All drains have been cleared by BC in the last year, but residents can (and did) help significantly in clearing blocked drains thus alleviating flooding – but not all drains were cleared.

Adopt your local drain and keep it clear of leaves and other debris to help yourself and your neighbours. Contact me if I can help.

#### Thornborough Parish Council (TPC) Report

TPC met most recently on 18 January 2023. The draft minutes are published on the TPC noticeboard and website (see link below) about a week after the meeting has taken place and are then approved at the next meeting. The minutes provide the formal record of the business. The reports for the newsletter focus on the meeting topics that are likely to be of greatest interest or relevance to residents.

#### **EEEEEEEEs**

The annual budget and precept have now been approved for the financial year 2023/4. The budget requirement to enable TPC to fulfil its statutory responsibilities is £32,510. The precept is the element of your council tax charge which the local council receives. The precept reflects the budget requirement less 'other income'. TPC's other income is predominantly the rent paid by plot holders, the Preschool and Thornborough Cricket Club that helps towards the costs of the allotments, sports field and pavilion. The increased precept for 2023/4 is £24,500. This is a 3.4% increase on the previous precept of £23,000. The estimated Band D property charge will be £78.96 – an increase of £2.66 for the year or 23 pence pcm.

In setting the budget and precept for the next financial year TPC was mindful that the current cost of living crisis is putting pressure on many households, whilst at the same recognising that its own bills are rising at an alarming rate. TPC has striven not to increase the precept more than absolutely necessary.

It might be helpful to mention some of TPC's more recent expenditure. For example, The cost of the tree work in the village and on the sports field was £1,700. TPC has spent nearly £1,300 in the past 3 months on statutory certification and repairs for the pavilion. The drought unsurprisingly resulted higher water bills and as for the cost of energy...

Avoiding a significant precept increase means TPC will need to apply for grant funding for any new projects or initiatives. TPC will also try to identify ways in which money might be saved if volunteers are willing to help with some of the maintenance tasks.

#### The Annual Activity Schedule

TPC has developed a new tool to manage its regular business and responsibilities. The purpose of the annual activity schedule is to ensure there

are lead councillors in place for those activities which need to be councillor led and, where relevant, information about community events can be made available in a timely way. For example, at its next meeting on in February TPC will discuss arranging a village litter pick in March. TPC will also start to plan the Annual Parish Assembly – formerly known as the annual parish meeting which tended to be confusing because parish councils are also required to hold an annual meeting. Whist irrespective of the name, responsibility for arranging the event nearly always falls to the local council, it should be a participative community event. Please do get in touch if you have ideas about how TPC can encourage better attendance and participation at the forthcoming Annual Parish Assembly. This is your village – TPC needs to know what is important to you and/or your family.

#### Thornborough Flood Action (TFAG)

TFAG has now submitted its final report which outlines just how much has been achieved since the flooding in December 2020. TPC is extremely grateful to TFAG and wishes to publicly acknowledge the important role it has played. TFAG suggests in its report that residents might be encouraged to 'adopt a drain' and be responsible for either clearing it if the problem is minor or reporting blockages using Fix My Street <a href="https://www.fixmystreet.buckscc.gov.uk/">https://www.fixmystreet.buckscc.gov.uk/</a>. We know Buckinghamshire Council is committed to continued increased expenditure for clearing drains as part of its work to help combat flooding so please do report any problems you come across — it could make all the difference when there is extreme rainfall.
